

EHA John Monash Medal

Criteria and submission guidelines

These criteria and submission guidelines apply to the Engineering Heritage Australia (EHA) John Monash Medal.

Who can nominate?

Any member of Engineers Australia can be nominated including international members.

Nominations are accepted from non-members however it's preferred that their achievements be supported by membership of Engineers Australia or one of the learned societies. A nominee's membership status may be considered when choosing an award winner.

Application criteria

In addition to the eligibility criteria, nominees should be able to demonstrate that they've made an outstanding contribution to the practice of heritage and conservation engineering or Australian engineering heritage history, over a period of more than 10 years.

They should also be able to demonstrate that they've contributed to Engineers Australia's purpose to advance society through great engineering.

Eligibility criteria

Criteria 1 Contribution to EA's purpose and strategic vision.	Nominees must demonstrate: <ul style="list-style-type: none">— achievement as an individual practitioner, manager or leader of a group in the area of practice of heritage and conservation engineering or— contribution within the general engineering profession and the community to the advancement of Australian engineering heritage and history.
Criteria 2 Formulation of resourceful, innovative and elegant engineering solutions, pioneering use of materials or methods.	Nominees must demonstrate: <ul style="list-style-type: none">— significant research into or development of techniques to aid the conservation of heritage items and— the publication of this information within the engineering and heritage communities.
Criteria 3 Contribution to sustainable, inclusive and ethical practices.	Nominees must demonstrate accomplishment in: <ul style="list-style-type: none">— Recording and documentation of items of engineering heritage such as long-term engineering projects, objects or people. This includes written histories of engineering endeavours, industries and precincts and recording of oral histories.— Education of engineers in the practice of heritage and conservation engineering.— Mentoring of engineers entering the field of heritage and conservation engineering.

Criteria 4

Contribution to and promotion of the engineering profession.

Optional

Notable and outstanding achievements during an engineering career.

Nominees must demonstrate how they've raised the awareness of engineers and the community to the importance of cultural heritage and engineering heritage in their capacity as a heritage engineering practitioner or volunteer.

This is an opportunity for the nominee to provide any additional supporting information about notable personal engineering achievements which demonstrate long-standing recognised prominence in leadership, policy or practice of Australian engineering heritage.
